Today's Hymns: Here I Am, Lord #509 VU. The chorus of this hymn uses the refrain, "I have heard you calling in the night, I will go, Lord, if you lead me, I will hold your people in my heart." These are the reasons we are Christians: We've heard you calling in the night. We feel you leading us. We have a desire to hold your people in our heart. So we respond to you, including worship on the Sabbath..

Come, O Fount of Every Blessing #559 VU. Robert Robinson penned the words at age 22 in the year 1757. He was a barber's apprentice who had lost his father and fell in need of help;' it appears in 1 Samuel 7, where the prophet Samuel sets up a stone as a monument [mount] to remember God's past help. In the hymn, the idea is that we will be motivated to greater praise when we remember how God has helped us, chiefly in Jesus having "sought" us when we were "strangers" and "wandering" away." It was not we who found God, but rather God who came to "rescue" us. We celebrate that in our Sunday worship.

I'm Gonna Live So God Can Use Me #575 VU. This is a joyful African-American spiritual that describes a Christian's outcome from worship, hearing the Word and a desire to respond.
